Card Check Bill Being Altered in US Senate Vote Anticipated in September

News reports from Congress are that a contingent of moderate Democrats in the U.S. Senate has rejected provisions of Card Check legislation that would make it easier for organized labor to form collect bargaining units, according to a New York Times report in mid July. The group opposed the key provision of the bill — that employers would be required to recognize a union as soon as a majority of workers signed cards saying they wanted a union.

Published news reports that once the legislation is tweaked, the Senate will approve it sometime after it returns to session after Labor Day. We’ll keep you posted.

Although this was not a scam, it does indicate that anything with an official seal that isn’t printed to the quality level that we see from our state print shop is important to make sure it is legitimate.
